Classical World Championship

This championship is being held in Brissago, Switzerland, and is sponsored by Danneman Tobacco. It is a 14 game match. After 11 games, the score is Peter Leko (Hungary) 6 vs Vladimir Kramnik (Russia) 5. Kramnik won the first game, But Leko came back winning games 5 & 8. Prague Unity Agreement

The Classical World Championship is now underway, as noted in the previous article. It has now been announced that the 2005 FIDE World Championship will now be played in the United Arab Emirates in January 2005. This pits Rustam Kasimdzhanov (Uzbekistan), 2004 FIDE World Champion against Gary Kasparov (Russia), the world's highest rated player, and 13th FIDE World Champion. The winners of these two matches will then play for the unified Classical/FIDE World Championship.

FIDE October Rating List

There is still only one player over 2800 : # 1 : Garry Kasparov (Russia), 13th FIDE World Champion – 2813.

There are 14 players in the 2700's. In the April list Viswanathan Anand (India), 2000 FIDE World Champion, moved up into second place ahead of Vladimir Kramnik , and he remains there, with a rating of 2781; Vladimir Kramnik (Russia), current Classical World Champion, is now # 3 and has 2760; the next two players are now closing in on Kramnik - # 4 is Alexander Morozevich (Russia), with 2758 and #5 is Veselin Topalov (Bulgaria) with 2757; Peter Leko (Hungary), the challenger to Kramnik in their current semi-final Prague Unity match, with 2743 is # 6; at # 9 is Judit Polgar (Hungary), the strongest women's player in the world, with 2728; at # 13 is Ruslan Ponomariov (Ukraine), 2002 FIDE World Champion, at 2710.

12th FIDE World Champion, Anatoly Karpov (Russia) is # 24 – 2682; 1999 FIDE World Champion, Alexander Khalifman (Russia) is # 34 – 2669; 2004 FIDE World Champion, Rustam Kasimdzhanov (Uzbekistan) is # 47 at 2650.

Here are a number of the younger players we're watching : Etienne Bacrot (France) is # 11 (up from # 14) – 2718; Alexander Grischuk (Russia) is #15– 2704; Francisco Vallejo Pons (Spain) is # 26 (up from # 29) – 2678; Teimour Radjabov (Azerbaijan) is # 39 – 2663;

The two highest Canadians with FIDE ratings are : GM Kevin Spraggett, former Canadian Champion, at 2589; GM Alexandre Le Siege, 2001 Canadian Champion, at 2528.

36 th Chess Olympiad

This tournament is being held in Calvia de Mallorca, Spain, and runs from Oct. 14 – 31. There are 135 national teams (782 players), and 91 women's teams (353 playrs). Good luck to both Canadian teams !
