

In the end, after 11 rounds, Rublevsky was able to maintain his sole hold on first place, and win the tournament. He had a performance rating of 2824. In second place, a ½ pt. back, was Ivanchuk, with a performance rating of 2784. The final standings were :

The winner, with 6.5 points was Rick Garel ( undefeated ). In 2<sup>nd</sup>, at 6 pts. was newly joined junior, Aman Hambleton. Tied for 3<sup>rd</sup>/5<sup>th</sup> at 5 pts. were Alex Rapoport, Joe Bellomo, and Maurice Smith.




